# TransCanadian Literatures: Representations of the City

3 ECTS

1<sup>st</sup> semester

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## **Aims and Objectives**

The myth of the wilderness and the North has haunted the Canadian imaginary to the extent that Canadians think of their national distinctiveness in terms of Nature. This emphasis on nature led the thematic criticism of the 1960s and 1970s to construct a literary canon where the natural landscape figures prominently, to the detriment of the cityscape and the representation of urban life and its influence on Canadian identity. All this, disregarding the fact that 80 per cent of Canadians live in cities and that the city has long played a paramount role in the production of Canadian literature.

This course aims to find answers to the following questions:

- Why have the city and urbanism been absent so often from critical discussions about Canadian literature and culture?
- What is unique, or not, about the literary representation of the city in Canada?
- How do literary representations of the city affect the way Canadians think of themselves?
- How does the urban impinge on the aesthetic?
- How does Canadian literature negotiate the transitions between the local, the regional, the national and the global in aesthetic, cultural and political terms?

## **Course Program**

- 1. Critical approaches to the city: urban theory and philosophies of space, sociology, cultural studies, globalization theory.
- 2. The Turn to the City in Canadian Literature and criticism: from the cultural nationalism of the 1960s and '70s to the urban glocality of the new millenium.
- 3. Representations of interstitial spaces in the city in contemporary Canadian literature

#### Assessment

- In addition, each student will have to prepare two oral presentations, one on a critical text and another on a literary work.
- Students will be evaluated on a combination of their participation in class, their oral presentations, and written assignments. There will be a final paper or project.
  - Participation and oral presentations: 50 %
  - Final project 50%
